Role Purpose:	Helping to deliver the Stand for Nature Wales Project in Radnorshire; taking part in surveying and monitoring wildlife and habitats on Pentwyn Nature Reserves, practical outdoor work, data collection and entering climate change and nature recovery. You will also take part in practical outdoor work, campaigning, and advocacy and event organising.
Office base:	Warwick House, Llandrindod Wells, Powys – RWT main Office We can only cover maximum of £100/ month of the mileage claims from your office base to other sites to work. Milage claims will be paid at the volunteer rate, which is 30p per mile.
Opportunity:	15 hours per week for 6 months. Some evening and weekend work will be required, and a 'time-off-in-lieu' system will be used to cover this.
Salary:	Volunteer position
Benefits:	£200 to cover accredited training
Traineeship period:	Six months
Eligibility:	You must be 16 – 24 years old to qualify for this program.

What sorts of tasks and activities will I be doing?
<p>For most of the time you will support the Head of Reserves and Land Management and the Reserves Officer to set up a monitoring baseline for our newest nature reserve, Pentwyn Farm, by collecting ecological data and analysing geospatial data to support future practical conservation work. There will be an opportunity to assist with the Trust's long-term Butterfly and Breeding Bird Surveys.</p> <p>For the rest of the time you will help the Stand for Nature Wales team deliver this Wales-wide project aimed to empower young people aged 9-24 to take action to tackle climate change and help get nature into recovery.</p>
How will my role fit in with the RWT's work?
<p>One of our strategic goals for 2030 is that nature is in recovery. Through your role you will be increasing the abundance and diversity of wildlife, inspiring people to take action for nature and helping to reduce the impact of climate change. By taking part in this traineeship, you will be helping not only deliver a very exciting project but be part of our work to secure a better future for the local communities and wildlife. Also, during and after this traineeship you will represent RWT as an ambassador of the Stand for Nature Wales Project.</p>
Who will I be volunteering with?
<p>You will be part of a dynamic and motivated team, with opportunities to work with our current staff of 20. RWT has recently trebled in size and has several exciting projects running. We have a history of training and developing staff through our seasonal posts.</p> <p>You will report to a dedicated mentor (Silvia Cojocar – Stand for Nature Wales Community Officer), who will support you, monitor your progress and help with personal development throughout your placement.</p>
Where will I be based?
<p>You will be based at RWT's main office – Warwick House, High Street, Llandrindod Wells, LD1 6AG, but will also travel to Pentwyn Farm Nature Reserve and some other nature reserves within Radnorshire, on a weekly basis. Travel from the office to various reserves will be arranged in advance.</p>
How much time will be expected to give?
<p>You will have to be available for 2 days a week for 6 months. The specific days you will need to commit to, will be discussed during the interview. On a normal day you will start at 9:00 and finish at 5:00, although this might vary sometimes. Some evening and weekend work will be required, and a 'time-off-in-lieu' system will be used to cover this.</p>
What's in for me?
<p>If you're enthusiastic, energetic, and determined to get into a paid role in data management and habitat mapping this could be a perfect first step for you.</p> <p>You will benefit from a substantial amount of training and plenty of active experience, learning from our experienced, professional employees and volunteers how and why we do things.</p> <p>Our training programme is specifically geared to giving you a wide range of employer-valued skills, depending on availability and what is best suited to your career plans.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Personal training budget (£200) to attend external courses approved by your mentor (e.g. First Aid) • Learn and gain experience in surveying methods, data analysis and usage of Quantum GIS software. • Learn and gain experience in nature conservation work, habitat management and sustainability. • Improve species identification skills and learn how to undertake a variety of wildlife and habitat surveys. • Improve skills and knowledge in practical work, and tool use. • Learn and gain experience in working with volunteers. • Gain experience in community organising, campaigns and digital marketing. • Develop good IT skills. • Learn about the wildlife and ecology of Radnorshire and Wales. <p>Your development and the type of experience you gain will be led by you.</p> <p>On top of that, you'll benefit from being in a dynamic and motivated team, meeting other trainees, employees, and volunteers. You'll get to see how a conservation organisation works, giving you the chance to build a network of contacts and develop communication and team-working skills that are so important to your future career.</p>
Will I be able to claim expenses?
<p>We can only cover a maximum of £100/ month of the mileage claims from your office base to other sites to work. Mileage claims will be paid at the volunteer rate, which is 30p per mile.</p>
What skills, experience and attributes do I need?
<p>What's most important is that you should have a desire to get involved and learn all you can.</p> <p>You'll need to have a keen interest in UK wildlife conservation, a good level of physical fitness, and be willing to supervise volunteers. Relevant volunteering or work experience is desirable.</p>

Background

Radnorshire Wildlife Trust (RWT) is one of 6 partner trusts on the Stand for Nature Wales Project (SFNW). The project is funded by the National Lottery Community, through the Climate Action Fund. The six Wildlife Trusts in Wales have come together to tackle climate change with the help of the young people of Wales. Also, this role will involve working with a UK wide project focused on community engagement and organising.
